PROVIDER HOT SHEET

- ⇒ Therapeutic Foster Care Providers: Providers of services licensed under General Statute 131D and General Statute 131E are *not* required to submit incident reports to the Incident Response Improvement System (IRIS). Therefore, please do not submit incident reports related to provision of Therapeutic Foster Care services unless the consumer is actively receiving mental health, substance abuse, or developmental disabilities services at the time of the adverse event. Please continue to follow all reporting requirements of the Department of Social Services and your accrediting agencies. Thanks very much.
- ⇒ Monthly IRIS Training for New Users: IRIS training is scheduled on the second Tuesday of each month from 9:00-11:00am at the Carlton Watkins Center. Please refer to the Provider Training Calendar for further details and registration.

\Rightarrow New Provider Endorsement Policy

A new provider Endorsement Policy is now posted on the DMH website at the following link: <u>http://www.ncdhhs.gov/mhddsas/stateplanimplementation/providerendorse/index.htm</u>. Endorsement applications received prior to January 1, 2011 will be processed using the Endorsement Policy dated December 3, 2007. All endorsement applications received as of January 1, 2011 will be processed under the new policy. Providers are encouraged to read the new policy in its entirety to ensure compliance with endorsement activities.

⇒ Elements of a Functional First Responder System

The Mecklenburg County Consumer and Family Advisory Committee (CFAC) and LME consider the following elements to constitute a Functional First Responder System (FFRS):

- The provider has a 911 prompt for medical crisis on their voicemail system.
- The provider has a prompt that provides a phone or pager number for assistance with "urgent" or "crisis" needs that cannot wait until the next business day (this number should connect to a person and not another telephone number or voicemail.)
- If crisis number contacts a pager, the message explains briefly what the caller will hear and how to respond.
- If the caller does not reach a live person, the voicemail message gives the caller a wait time of no more than 15 minutes to expect a return call.
- If the caller does not reach a live person, the call is returned within 15 minutes.

All providers of enhanced Medicaid services that are required to serve as First Responders should ensure that these elements are included in your First Responder System. The LME and representatives

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from CFAC will periodically test providers through Mock Calls to ensure compliance with these requirements.

⇒ Balanced Scorecard Data will again be collected on an Excel spreadsheet in Provider Connect. Data is required from agencies that provided Community Support, Community Support Team, ACT, Psychosocial Rehab and Targeted Case Management to IPRS consumers from July – December 2010. The spreadsheet contains the reporting form with instructions. The spreadsheets will be available in the eCura Provider Connect download folder in a subfolder titled "Balanced Scorecard Data" on or about 1/12/2011. Providers are to complete the spreadsheet and upload it to Provider Connect no later than the due date on the form, January 21, 2011. If you did not provide the above services from July – December 2010, there is no spreadsheet for your agency and no report is required for this reporting period.

CAP-MR/DD Utilization Review Provider Trainings

Pathways CAP-MR/DD Utilization Review staff will be conducting provider trainings for Intellectual/ Developmental Disability providers and targeted case managers. This training is essential for those who serve consumers receiving or hope to receive CAP-MR/DD services.

- Get the standardized screening tools for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and Traumatic Brain Injury.


For those who choose to develop services for these veterans:

NOTE: The SAMHSA grant does not include funds for services, but consumers may be eligible for coverage through Medicaid, Medicare, IPRS, or other existing funding sources. Mecklenburg County DSS staff are currently providing pre-applications for Medicaid and food stamps in preparation for release from jail.







GLOBAL APPRAISAL OF INDIVIDUAL NEEDS (GAIN)

The Global Appraisal of Individual Needs (GAIN) is an assessment instrument used for diagnosis, placement, and treatment planning. GAIN is used in a variety of settings, including outpatient, intensive outpatient, partial hospitalization, methadone, short-term residential, long-term residential, therapeutic community, and correctional programs. The GAIN is used for individuals 12 years of age and older.

Content

The GAIN has eight core sections: Each section contains questions on the recency of problems, extent of symptoms, and recent

- Mental & Emotional Health
- Environment & Living Situation
- Legal
- Vocational

prevalence. The assessment also looks at service utilization including lifetime use, recency of use, and frequency. There are over 100 scales and subscales included in the GAIN.

Materials and Administration

The GAIN is available in both paper and electronic forms. It can be administered with a computer or with paper and pencil. The assessment should be completed by a certified GAIN administrator to maintain validity and reliability.

G.AIN-Short Screener (G.AIN-SS) = 2-page (5 minute) screening form for use with the general population to quickly identify those with internalizing or externalizing disorders, issues with crime/violence, and/or substance use.

 $G\overline{AIN}$ -Quick ($G\overline{AIN}$ -Q) = 11-15 page (20-30 minute) form for basic assessment of a targeted population to determine eligibility and need for referral. It can also be used to support motivational interviewing related to substance use.

GAIN-Initial (GAIN-I) = 61-100 page (120 minute) standardized assessment for use in substance abuse diagnosis, placement, treatment planning, outcome monitoring, economic analysis, and/or program planning. This assessment can also be used to support motivational interviewing. Please see the EBT primer for additional information about the GAIN.

Licensure, Training, and Support

Chestnut Health Systems holds the copyright of the GAIN. GAIN software, which includes data entry as well as the ability to create clinical reports, is available for purchase. There is a licensing fee of \$100 per agency for five years of access to the family of GAIN assessments.

Training Options for GAIN Quick or GAIN Initial:

There are two training options for utilizing the GAIN for Assessments.

Option 1:

There is 1 National and 5 Regional Trainers in North Carolina who can provide training for the GAIN. By consultation <u>Please see the next page</u> for NC GAIN Trainer Support.

Option 2:

The other training option is attendance at one of the trainings held by Chestnut Health Systems. GAIN trainings are held throughout the year and continuing education credits (CEU) are available. The website address to find out more information on this training is <u>www.chestnut.org</u>
