### **Education Session**

The education session will focus on an issue that will require significant attention from the MPO during 2012: the potential expansion of MUMPO's planning area due to the expansion of the Charlotte urbanized area and the resulting need to modify the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

### 1. Call to Order

Mayor Ted Biggers called the January 2012 MUMPO meeting to order at 7:30 PM.

### 2. Election of Officers

### Chairman:

Sarah McAulay nominated Mayor Ted Biggers for MPO chairman; Mayor James Taylor seconded the nomination. A motion was made by Jerry Simpson to close the nominations. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion which passed unanimously. Upon being put to a vote, Mayor Biggers was unanimously elected the MPO chairman for 2012.

### Vice-Chairman:

Mr. Simpson nominated Mayor Lynda Paxton for MPO vice-chairman; Margaret Desio seconded the nomination. Barbara Harrison nominated Mayor Daune Gardner; Mayor Gardner seconded the nomination. A motion was made by Mayor Paxton to close the nominations. David Howard seconded the motion which passed unanimously. Upon being put to a vote, Mayor Paxton received 30 votes and Mayor Gardner received two votes. Mayor Paxton was elected the MPO vice-chairman for 2012.

### 3. Approval of Minutes

### Summary:

Chairman Biggers asked if everyone had had an opportunity to review the November 2011 minutes.

#### Motion:

Ms. McAulay made a motion to adopt the November 2011 minutes as presented. Mr. Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the November 2011 minutes were approved unanimously.

### 4. Citizen Comment Period

#### Summary:

Jay Priester of Cambridge Properties addressed the MPO regarding agenda item #5, Prosperity Church Road Extension-Thoroughfare Plan amendment. Mr. Priester disc used the Huntersville Board of Commissioners' action on this matter, and requested a deferral on action and permission to return to the Board and local property owners.

### 5. Prosperity Church Road Extension-Thoroughfare Plan Amendment

### Presenter:

Bill Coxe, TCC Chairman

### Summary:

Mr. Coxe stated that the Huntersville Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to recommend to the MPO that the Thoroughfare Plan remain unchanged, and added that a deferral would be meaningless since MUMPO's Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) states that the MPO "cannot override the position of any individual local municipality on a project for a road that does not carry an I., U.S., or N.C. route designation when any portion of

the project is within that municipality's corporate limits or sphere of influence except by 3/4 majority vote of all votes eligible to be cast."

### Motion:

Ms. McAulay made a motion to make no changes to the Thoroughfare Plan. Mr. Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

# 6. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendments a. Miscellaneous Amendments

Presenter:

Robert Cook

Mr. Cook reviewed the six proposed amendments listed below. He stated that costs associated with the Statewide projects would be incurred only if projects occur in MUMPO's planning area, and that the TCC had unanimously recommended adoption of the TIP amendments. He added that the MPO will see similar minor amendments in the future due to more scrutiny of the TIP by FHWA officials to ensure that the state's MPO's TIPs match the State TIP, as required by federal law.

### Motion:

Mayor Taylor made a motion to approve the TIP amendments as presented. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

### b. McKee Road TIP Amendment (TIP #U-4713B)

Presenter:

Ralph Messera, Town of Matthews

Mr. Messera stated that the amendment was limited to the name identifying the project. The project will now be identified as "Campus Ridge Road Realignment" to better reflect the nature of the project. He stated that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO approve the TIP amendment.

### Motion:

Mayor Taylor made a motion to approve the TIP amendment as presented. Mayor Paxton seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

### 7. Red Line Trail

Presenter:

Gwen Cook, Mecklenburg County Park & Recreation

### **Summary**:

Ms. Cook presented information to the MPO in the form of a Power Point presentation, the contents of which are incorporated into the minutes. She provided an overview of the project, which is a 30 mile corridor of multi-use, off-road trail connecting Mooresville and Charlotte and mostly parallels the proposed Red Line commuter rail line. She requested that the MPO adopt a resolution supporting the project, and noted that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO do so.

### Motion:

John Collett made a motion to support the Red Line Trail and to adopt the resolution included in the agenda packet. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

### 8. Functional Classification System Modification

Presenter:

Robert Cook

### Summary:

Mr. Cook stated that NCDOT had advised MUMPO of the need to modify the Functional Classification System to change the status of Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard in Monroe to reflect the project's completion. The road's current classification is "New Construction-Minor Arterial" and "New Construction-Major Collector." The proposed classification is "Minor Arterial." Mr. Cook stated that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO approve the modification.

### Motion:

Mayor Taylor made a motion to modify the Functional Classification System and as presented and to adopt the resolution included in the agenda packet. Mr. Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

### 9. Mobility Fund

Presenter:

Nicholas Polimeni

### Summary:

Mr. Polimeni stated that NCDOT is currently soliciting candidate projects to determine which project(s) will be next to be funded with the Mobility Fund, and that the deadline for submitting candidate projects is February 29. He provided an overview of the Mobility Fund to the MPO, including information about when the funding was first made available, which project is currently funded with the Mobility Fund, and information on the future funding schedule. After reviewing the minimum eligibility requirements and scoring criteria, Mr. Polimeni asked that the MPO allow the TCC to endorse candidate projects from the MUMPO region, on behalf of the MPO, for submission to NCDOT. He stated that the reason for the request is because the MPO does not meet prior to the project submittal deadline, and the TCC needs more time to discuss potential candidate projects.

Mr. Howard asked if the Board of Transportation will be selecting projects. Barry Moose replied that staff of NCDOT's Strategic Planning Office of Transportation (SPOT) will analyze the projects and that that will determine the recommendation made to the Secretary. Mr. Howard emphasized that Mobility Fund dollars should be used for major projects. Ms. McAulay asked Mr. Moose about his thoughts on future projects. Mr. Moose stated that he thought that the widening of I-85 (to widen the last four-lane section between Charlotte and Salisbury) was in competition, and also suggested the Independence Boulevard project (U-209B) and that Mobility Fund dollars could be used to replace GARVEE funds. TCC chairman Bill Coxe stated that he would work with Chairman Biggers on this issue before a TCC endorsement is finalized.

### Motion:

Ms. McAulay made a motion to approve the request as presented. Mayor Taylor seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

### 10. Eastfield Road/I-485 Development Proposal

### Presenter:

Jonathan Crowder, Designcraft, P.A.

### Summary:

Mr. Crowder presented information to the MPO in the form of a Power Point presentation, the contents of which are incorporated into the minutes. He stated that Gandy Communities is proposing to develop a tract of land along Eastfield Road near the NC 115 interchange with I-485, and has proposed to realign the western end of Eastfield Road through the project area. The proposed realignment will require the MPO to amend the Thoroughfare Plan. Mr. Crowder added that a public meeting was scheduled for the following evening (January 19, 2012) at Independence Hills Baptist Church and that the project schedule was to return to the MPO in March for action amending the Thoroughfare Plan.

Mr. Howard stated that Charlotte councilmember Michael Barnes has expressed concern with moving forward on the rezoning associated with the entirety of the Gandy property.

### 11. Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ) Program

### Presenter:

Bjorn Hansen, Centralina COG

### **Summary**:

Mr. Hansen stated that Centralina COG is under contract with MUMPO to administer the project selection process for MUMPO's CMAQ funds. Monthly project development meetings are being held to assist member jurisdictions develop CMAQ applications in advance of the April 27 deadline for applications.

### 12. Adjourn

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM.

### **MPO Education Session**

The regular MPO meeting was preceded by an education session at 6:00 PM. The session focused on the proposed projects to improve the southern section of I-485 and I-77 North. NCDOT Division 10 engineer Barry Moose opened the discussion. MPO members also heard from Jim Ray of Ray Strategies and Ted Hamer of KPMG regarding the possible use of a public-private partnership to advance the I-77 North project.

Subject: Prosperity Church Road Extension Alignment North of Eastfield Road

On January 17, 2012, the Town Board voted to reaffirm the existing MUMPO alignment for the extension of Prosperity Church Road north of Eastfield Road. Cambridge Properties, the developers of the Huntersville Village property, have crafted a new alignment that would alter the route within their property. There is a minor alteration (three feet plus or minus) as the route enters the Olmsted property and Olmsted representatives have indicated acceptance of this change. The exit point from the Olmsted property to the Davis property at the northern end of the alignment would be in the same location and same curvature as the current MUMPO alignment. Cambridge Properties requests that the Town Board endorse this new proposal.

Staff finds the proposed alignment acceptable. We believe it will yield a slightly better development layout on the Cambridge property than would the current MUMPO alignment.

ACTION RECOMMENDED: Board to consider endorsing the new route for Prosperity Church Road Extension as proposed by Cambridge Properties and as shown in red on the attached map.

Prosperity Church Road Realignment North of Eastfield Road

On January 17, 2012 the Town Board discussed a proposal by Cambridge Properties to shift the MUMPO approved alignment for the extension of Prosperity Church Road beginning just north of Eastfield Road and re-joining the MUMPO alignment on property owned by the Davis family. After discussion, the Board voted to re-affirm (i.e. not change) the MUMPO alignment. At the center of the discussion was a desire to not worsen the impact on the Davis property.

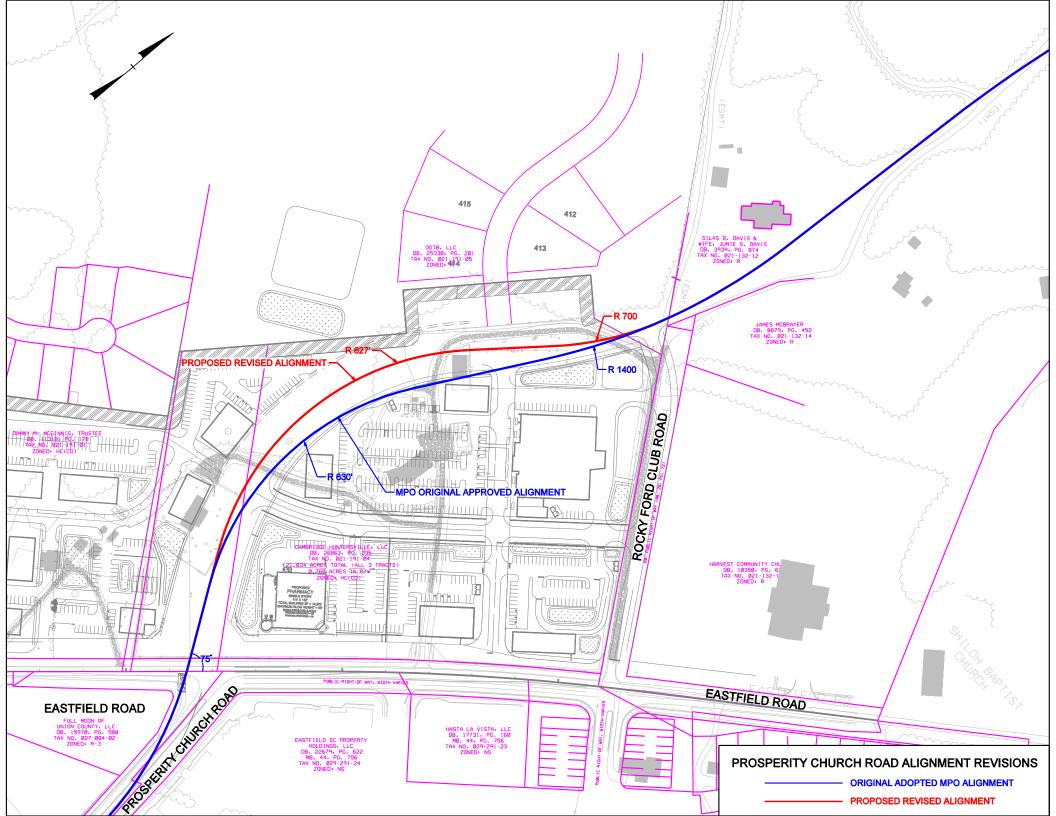
Cambridge Properties has directed their engineers to craft an alignment that allows change within the Cambridge Property but does not alter the MUMPO alignment's impact on the Davis property. They have submitted the alignment to MUMPO staff and Town Engineering Department and both find the alignment acceptable from a design standpoint. There is a minor (roughly 3 feet) shift from the MUMPO alignment to the new route as it crosses into the Olmsted property but there is no shift at the Davis' property line. The attached map shows the current MUMPO alignment and the revised proposed alignment.

Cambridge Properties intends to move forward with development on the property with slight modifications to the existing approved (Crescent Resources, 2009) conditional zoning plan. Any changes to the plan are intended to be sufficiently minor in nature as to allow administrative approval of the change rather than requiring the extensive site plan amendment process. The latest version of the proposed changes has been reviewed by the Town and County engineers. Justin and I have focused on the internal roadway alignments and circulation/driveway/access arrangement issues. The shift in the alignment of Prosperity Church Road allows minor shifts in the internal roadway structure. We find that the proposed layout is better from a traffic circulation standpoint than the original Crescent plan.

Staff is comfortable supporting the proposed shift in the Prosperity Church Road Extension. Due to a specific clause in the MUMPO Memorandum of Understanding, the shift must be approved by the MUMPO.

**SUBJECT: TIP Amendments** 

### **BACKGROUND**

The Charlotte Area Transit System has been awarded to new capital grants for new services in the MPO. These are new dollars to the MPO, are dedicated to the stated projects and do not reduce or adversely impact any project in the TIP. The following are descriptions of the TIP Amendments that will be brought before the MPO on March 21, 2012.

- As part of the federal Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) program, CATS has been awarded \$18 million for the expansion of station platforms on the LYNX Blue Line Corridor so that they will be able to accommodate three car trains. The grant will be used to design the extension of all the stations along the line, upgrade the power for the entire line, and will construct two station extensions, one Uptown and I-485. This will allow three car express trains for events and position CATS to expand the remaining stations as funding is identified. CATS and NCDOT will provide the local match to these funds for a total project cost of \$22.5 million.
- CATS has been awarded \$500,000 in New Starts funding to be used explicitly for Streetcar. These funds will be utilized to upgrade the existing Gamaco Trolley vehicles in order to make them 'street-worthy' by federal safety standards. The work will include braking improvements and other safety & security enhancements. The City of Charlotte will provide the local match for a total project cost of \$625,000.

Finally, as stated above these awards represent new money and do not financially impact any project currently in the state's transportation program. They both are 80% federal funds. If you have any questions prior to the MPO meeting please contact me at 704-336-6900.

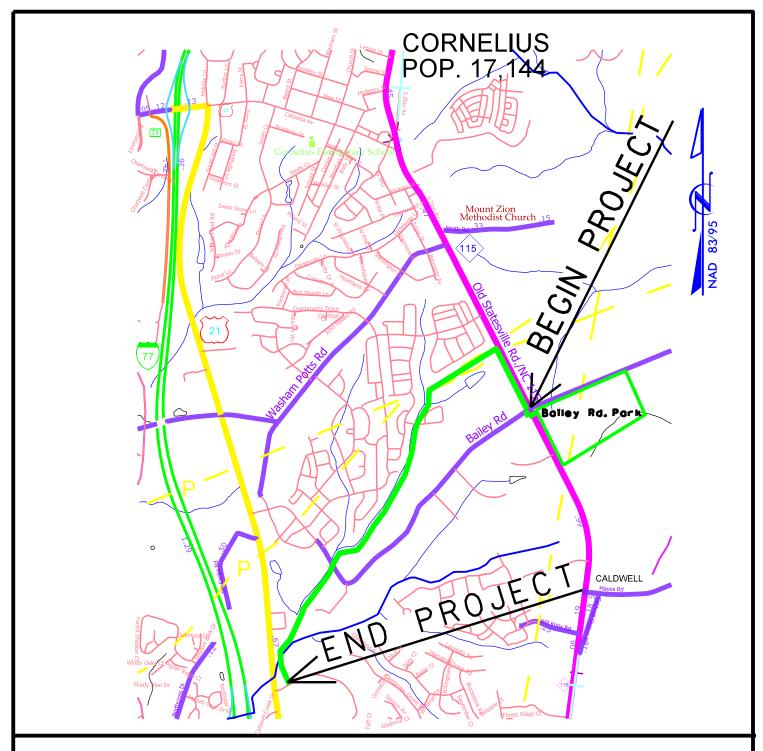

#### **BACKGROUND**

*Functional classification* is the process by which streets and highways are grouped into classes, or systems, according to the character of service they are intended to provide. Generally, highways fall into one of four broad categories: principal arterial, minor arterials, collector roads, and local roads.

The *National Highway System* is a network of roadways important to the nation's economy, defense, and mobility developed by the US Department of Transportation in cooperation with the states, local officials and MPOs.

### **PROPOSED REVISIONS**

TIP Project R-2559A is a 2.67 mile section of the original concept of the Monroe Bypass between US 601 and US 74. When the original Bypass concept was expanded to include the Monroe Connector, this section became unnecessary, but has remained a component of the Functional Classification System and the National Highway System (NHS). In order to make the Functional Classification maps and NHS maps consistent with the changes associated with the overall Monroe Connector/Bypass project, NCDOT has requested that MUMPO act officially to:

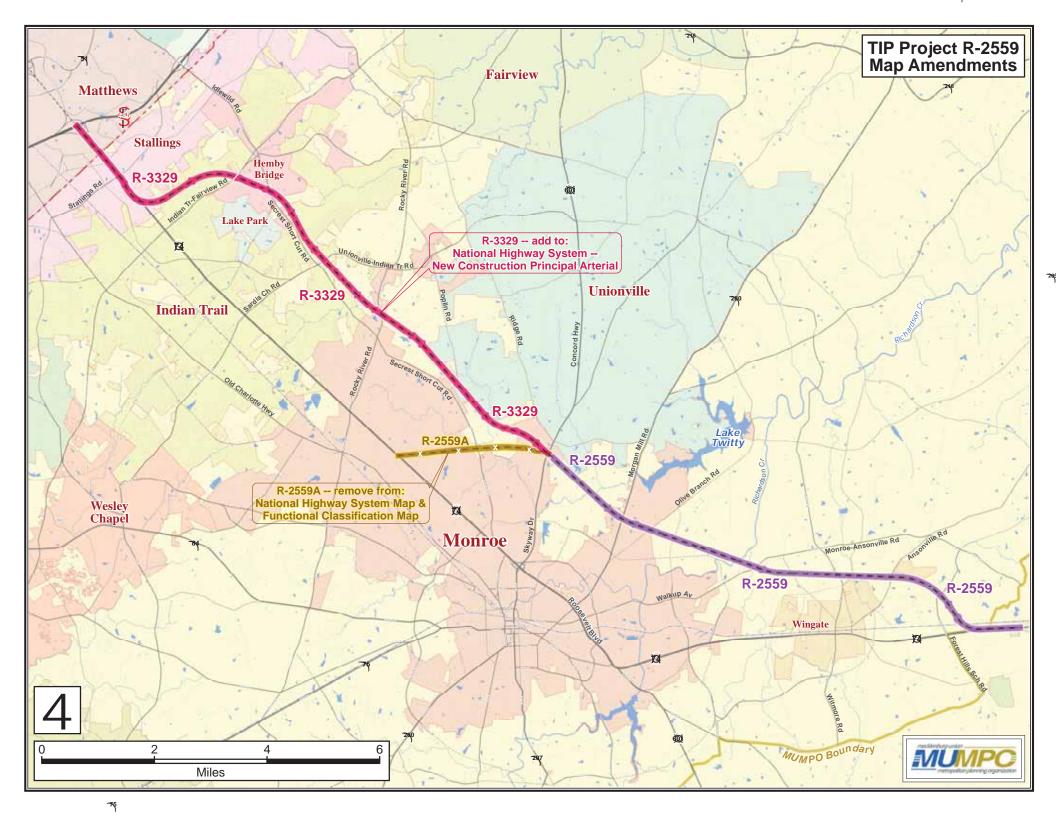
- 1. Remove R-2559A from the Functional Classification System; and
- 2. Remove R-2559A from the National Highway System; and
- 3. Add R-3329 (Monroe Connector), from I-485 to US 601, to the National Highway System as "New Construction-Principal Arterial."

TIP project R-2559B (US 601 east to US 74) is a part of the NHS; no action is needed for this section of the Monroe Connector/Bypass.

SUBJECT: I-77 & I-485 TIP & LRTP Amendments and Conformity Determination

### REQUESTED ACTION

NCDOT has requested that the MPO approve the release of documents associated with planned improvements to I-77 and I-485 for public review and comment. Specifically, the documents were for:

- 1. amendments to the 2012-2018 Transportation Improvement Program;
- 2. amendments to the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan; and
- 3. the air quality conformity determination on the 2012-2018 TIP and 2035 LRTP.

### **BACKGROUND**

NCDOT is currently analyzing significant improvements to:

- I-77, from center city Charlotte to W. Catawba Avenue in Cornelius; and
- I-485, from I-77 to Rea Road.

Both projects differ from how they are currently programmed in the 2012-2018 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan.

### **PROJECT DETAILS**

### I-77, TIP project I-5405

The following options have been analyzed. One option will be chosen before a conformity determination is made.

- 1. Convert the existing HOV lanes to high occupancy toll (HOT) operations and extend them north to exit 28. (2015 horizon year with HOT2+person occupancy)
- 2. Convert the existing HOV lanes to high occupancy toll (HOT) operations and extend them north to exit 28. (2015 horizon year with HOT3+person occupancy)
- 3. Convert the existing HOV lanes to high occupancy toll (HOT) operations and expand them to provide 2 HOT lanes in each direction between I-85 and exit 28. (2015 horizon year with 2 lanes and HOT2+person occupancy)
- 4. Convert the existing HOV lanes to high occupancy toll (HOT) operations and expand them to provide 2 HOT lanes in each direction between I-85 and exit 28. (2015 horizon year with 2 lanes HOT3+person occupancy)

### I-485, TIP project R-4902

The following scenarios have been analyzed:

1. From I-77 to Rea Road (will include the flyover on Johnston Road and all auxiliary lanes currently in place)

Scope: Widen to 6 general purpose lanes

Horizon year: 2025

2. From Rea Road to US 74 (Independence Blvd.)

Scope: Widen to 8 lanes (6 general purpose lanes + 2 Express Toll Lane and all auxiliary

lanes currently in place) Horizon year: 2025

### TCC RECOMMENDATION

At its March 1 meeting, NCDOT requested that the TCC recommend to the MPO that it release for public comment documents (noted above) associated with planned improvements for I-77 and I-485. Because the documents were not available at the meeting, the TCC passed a motion that stated as follows:

- Recommend to the MPO that it release the documents for public review, conditioned upon an
  assessment of the documents at a March Transportation Staff meeting that results in the TCC
  finding them acceptable; and
- If the documents are not found to be acceptable, then the TCC will recommend to the MPO that it give the TCC the authority to release the documents at its April 5 meeting.

A Transportation Staff meeting was held on Wednesday, March 14. Seven TCC members and alternates attended, along with representatives of NCDOT and the Federal Highway Administration. Following considerable discussion, the TCC members determined that it was appropriate for the MPO to act to release the documents for public review.

**Congestion Management Process & Red Line Trail** 

### **BACKGROUND**

Work on two projects programmed in the FY 2012 Unified Planning Work Program will not get underway until late in the fiscal year, or be delayed until FY 2013.

### 1. Congestion Management Process

\$180,000 was programmed in the FY 2012 Unified Planning Work Program for work associated with the preparation of the Congestion Management Process (CMP). Of that amount, \$30,000 was used to prepare the *Congestion Management Framework Guide* by J.S. Lane Company, LLC. The *Framework Guide* was designed to provide MUMPO with detailed procedural guidance necessary to efficiently carry out the next phase of the project, preparation of the CMP update.

City procurement staff estimates it may take two to three months to finalize the contract for the CMP. In order to fully utilize the resources programmed this year, and in light of the uncertainty associated with FY 2013 funding, staff proposes to carry over into FY 2013 \$140,000 of the remaining \$150,000 programmed in FY 2012 for the CMP. The remaining \$10,000 will remain programmed in FY 2012 for any work conducted on the CMP before the end of the fiscal year.

### 2. Red Line Trail

The Town of Cornelius originally proposed that MUMPO funds be used for work on the Red Line Trail; however, due to unexpected staffing changes, the work was not pursued. The Mecklenburg County Park & Recreation Department is now the lead agency on the project, but will not be able to begin work until FY 2013.

### REQUESTED ACTION

Staff requests the MPO to amend the FY 2012 UPWP to transfer funds from FY 2012 to FY 2013for the two projects described above. The table on the following page provides additional details. Note that staff proposed to retain \$10,000 in FY 2012 to support efforts to produce the Congestion Management Process.

SUBJECT: Draft FY 2013 Unified Planning Work Program

### **BACKGROUND**

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is the MPO's annual listing of planning priorities and work tasks for the fiscal year. The UPWP includes a description of planning work and resulting products, the agency responsible for the listed work, time frames for completing identified tasks, project costs and funding sources.

### **FUNDING LEVELS**

As has been the case the last few years, work on the UPWP is beginning without knowing the full amount of funds that will be available to carry out the MPO's responsibilities. SAFETEA-LU has not been reauthorized and transportation funding, including planning funds, has been appropriated through a series of continuing resolutions for only short periods of time. Therefore, the UPWP's development will begin with an assumption that funding levels for FY 2013 will be the same as FY 2011.

MUMPO's three funding sources and their estimated FY 2013 funding amounts are listed below:

Planning (PL) funds \$725,000
 STP-DA PL funds supplement \$800,000
 Section 5303 funds \$345,000

### PL FUNDS CARRYOVER

The draft FY 2013 UPWP includes a carryover of funds from FY 2013 for two projects: the Congestion Management Process (CMP) in Task Code V-1, Congestion Management Strategies (\$140,000), and; Red Line Trail study in Task Code VI-10, Corridor Protection & Special Studies (\$28,000).

The total amount shown on the attached spreadsheet for PL Funds indicates a slightly higher figure than the FY 2011 funding amount of \$725,000. This reflects the carryover of \$28,000 for the Red Line Trail study.

### **SECTION 5303**

Total funding on the attached spreadsheet for Section 5303 funds indicates a funding level that exceeds the anticipated amount to be received. MPO staff will be working with CDOT and CATS staff to resolve funding allocation differences before the final UPWP is presented for approval at MPO's May meeting.

### **NEXT STEPS**

- 1. Work with CDOT and CATS staff to resolve Section 5303 funding allocation differences.
- 2. Finalize all allocation recommendations through TCC and Transportation Staff meetings.
- 3. Present final draft UPWP to the TCC: May 10, 2012.
- 4. Present final draft to MPO for adoption: May 16, 2012.
