Concurrently, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning staff has initiated a process for the preparation of a small area plan for the Prosperity Church/Hucks area in Charlotte. These planning studies share a common boundary (Eastfield Road), and each includes an evaluation of the adequacy of the primary roadway network (both existing and proposed) to serve the respective plan areas. It is proposed that staff from Huntersville, Charlotte, MUMPO and other agencies work together to complete alignment studies for:

- Hambright Road (from Everette Keith Road to Eastfield Road) and Everette Keith Road (from Eastfield Road to Verhoeff Drive) in Huntersville
- and for Ridge Road (from Eastfield to Prosperity Church Road) and Hucks Road (from Spring Park Drive to Browne Road) in Charlotte,
- and a roadway classification study for Eastfield Road (from the I-485 bridge to Prosperity Church Road).

An overview of the scope of work and locations of these roadway segments will be provided.

1. Call to Order

MPO Vice-Chair Mayor Lynda Paxton called the July 2012 MUMPO meeting to order at 7:10 PM.

2. Approval of Minutes

Vice-Chair Paxton requested action on the May 2012 minutes and June 2012 special meeting minutes.

Motion:

Sarah McAulay made a motion to approve the May 2012 meeting minutes and the June 2012 special meeting minutes as presented. David Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote the minutes for both meetings were unanimously approved.

3. Citizen Comment Period

There were no citizen comments; however, NCDOT Division 10 engineer Barry Moose announced that he was resigning to take a job in the private sector. The MPO members thanked Mr. Moose for his service.

4. Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ)

Presenter

Summary:

Mr. Hansen stated that the request before the MPO was to approve the CMAQ project list as presented. He noted that the list was developed for projects to be funded in fiscal years 2016 and 2017. Some of the projects were briefly reviewed, including the start up support for CATS' Blue Line Extension. It was stated that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO adopt the list.

Motion:

Lynette Rinker made a motion to approve the list of CMAQ projects as presented. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

5. Transportation Improvement Program

a. Miscellaneous TIP Amendments

Summary:

Mr. Cook stated that the request before the MPO was to approve the list of TIP amendments as presented. He stated that three of the nine projects were Statewide projects, and that equity funds for those projects would be used only if projects are implemented in the region. He stated that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO approve the TIP amendments.

Motion:

Dumont Clarke made a motion to approve the TIP amendments as presented. Mr. Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

b. Release of Draft TIP

Mr. Cook stated that NCDOT officials had indicated that a draft TIP would be released for public review in September.

6. CONNECT Consortium Appointments

Presenter:

Summary:

Mr. Cook stated that the MPO had earlier in the year approved MUMPO's participation in the CONNECT Consortium, and in so doing, had agreed to appoint an MPO member to the Policy Forum and a staff member or TCC member to the Program Forum. He reported that Chairman Biggers had recommended that Ms. McAulay be appointed to the Policy Forum and that Jonathan Wells was recommended by the TCC to be appointed to the Program Forum. Mr. Cook stated that Mr. Wells is the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning Department's representative to the TCC.

Motion:

Mr. Howard made a motion to appoint Sarah McAulay to the CONNECT Policy Forum and Jonathan Wells to the CONNECT Program Forum. Ms. Rinker seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

7. 2012 Certification Review

Presenter:

Summary:

Ms. Barren presented the findings of MUMPO's 2012 Certification Review. She stated that the review resulted in one corrective action-MUMPO must complete its Congestion Management Process (CMP) by March 2012. Mr. Cook stated that work was already underway on the CMP.

8. Environmental Justice-Public Involvement Plan Amendments

Presenter:

Toni Tupponce, Tupponce II Enterprises

Summary:

Ms. Tupponce provided information to the MPO via a Power Point presentation, the contents of which are incorporated in the minutes. Ms. Tupponce's presentation provided an update to the MPO on the project to amend MUMPO's Public Involvement Plan (PIP) to incorporate two items: methods to expand and improve outreach efforts to the region's environmental justice populations and a Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan. It was explained that Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 required MPOs to undertake the two projects, but that it was also simply the right thing to do because the transportation planning process is most effective when all residents are provided an opportunity to participate. Public outreach efforts were reviewed, including the recent 45-day public comment period. Ms. Tupponce stated that staff would return at September's MPO meeting with a formal request to amend the PIP.

9. I-77 & I-485 Projects

a. Project Update

Presenter:

Bill Coxe, TCC Chairman

Summary:

Mr. Coxe reported that the I-485 project to widen the segment between I-77 and Rea Road (R-4902) was on schedule. Regarding the I-77 HOT lanes project (I-5405), he discussed the parallel efforts: development of environmental documents and work on a potential public/private partnership. He also reminded the MPO of upcoming public meetings on August 1 & 2.

Margaret Desio asked if there were any updates on the Monroe Connector/Bypass. Mr. Cook stated that he would request NCDOT to have a representative at September's MPO meeting.

b. N. Community House Road Bridge & Extension (U-5519)

Presenter:

Robert Cook

Summary:

Mr. Cook stated that a developer planned to construct the N. Community House Road bridge over I-485, and that the bridge would be built while I-485 was under construction between I-77 and Rea Road (R-4902). Amending MUMPO's TIP and LRTP and making a finding of air quality conformity is necessary despite private funding because of the impact on the interstate facility. Mr. Cook stated that the request of the MPO was to permit staff to initiate the public involvement effort as soon as all appropriate documents were ready for public review. He noted that the TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO permit staff to do so because it would allow the project to proceed as quickly as possible.

Motion:

Mr. Clarke made a motion to authorize the start of a public comment period at the time all appropriate material is available for public review. Mr. Howard seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

10. MUMPO Expansion

a. Boundary Determination Update

Presenter:

Robert Cook

Summary:

Mr. Cook presented information to the MPO via a Power Point presentation, the contents of which are incorporated into the minutes. The presentation focused on the status of the expanded boundary.

- Iredell County: Iredell and MPO staff have settled on the S. Yadkin River as the most logical northern boundary. A slight variation will be needed because the river's course is such that using it would result in a small portion of I-40 being located outside the MPO's planning area in Iredell County. All agree that the full length of I-40 in the county should be in the jurisdiction of a single transportation planning organization.
- Gaston County: MUMPO will not have to expand into Gaston County, but will need to extend its congestion management process into the portion of the Charlotte UZA that reaches into Gaston County.
- Lincoln County: Mr. Cook described a westerly boundary on a map as the most likely boundary, but the Gaston MPO and Lincoln County still must determine if that MPO will expand into Lincoln. MUMPO's final boundary will depend in part on that decision.
- Union County: staff is working with Union County and Rocky River RPO staff on determining a final boundary. A workshop with the Board of Commissioners is being planned.

Next steps in the process were then discussed.

- Regional agreements that must be executed with neighboring MPOs to transfer MUMPO's
 responsibilities for portions of the Charlotte UZA that extend into counties with existing MPOs or MPOs
 that plan to expand their planning area.
- Presentations to incoming governing bodies are being scheduled. Presentations to the Iredell County Board of Commissioners and the Mooresville Board of Commissioners have already been scheduled; other governing bodies are pending.

b. MOU Subcommittee

Presenter:

Robert Cook

Summary:

Mr. Cook reported on the results of the first MOU Subcommittee meeting that was held prior to the start of the MPO meeting. He stated that the subcommittee decided to meet on the third Wednesday of each month at 4:00 PM and that the representation from incoming jurisdictions should include a representative of the Lincoln and Iredell commissions, as well as one representative of the three Iredell municipalities. It was noted that the subcommittee reviewed a list of major issues developed by staff, and added to that list with additional issues that need to be addressed. The subcommittee's work should be complete by February in order to meet the deadline to fully incorporate the new members into the MPO.

11. Adjourn

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM.

Dear Renee:

As we discussed previously, the NCDOT Rail Division proposes to relocate the historic Thrift Depot to a new site, using FHWA Enhancement Funds, and will soon commence NEPA procedures. The MUMPO meets on September 13th, and will consider whether to endorse the funding. However the City of Charlotte has raised a concern regarding the Thrift Depot project impact on its Freedom Drive Relocation project (NC Highway 27).

The attached plan shows a proposed alignment of Freedom Drive in Charlotte, which does impact the proposed Thrift Depot site. However the impact is minimal as far as the depot is concerned. The City asked me to determine whether the Freedom Drive project would face Section 106 impacts if it is aligned as shown impacts this parcel, which will be the new home of a historic structure. I would appreciate your feedback on this issue prior to the MUMPO meeting. If you determine the City will not face Section 106 impacts if the alignment is as shown, there is more assurance the Thrift Depot funding will be approved.



Thank you for your letter of August 10, 2012, and follow-up email message of August 29, 2012, about the minor use of land from the proposed new location/parcel for the Thrift Depot. As I understand the question, the City of Charlotte would like to know if its plans to relocate and upgrade Freedom Drive might be affected by the need to use a small portion of the parcel, to which the Department of Transportation's Rails Division proposes to move the Thrift Depot. Having reviewed the proposed realignment and information about the move and reuse of the historic depot, we offer the following comments.

The Thrift Depot is a contributing element in the Piedmont and Northern Railway Linear Historic District, a property determined eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. It is currently unused and in disrepair. However, there are plans to move the building to a new location in the southeast quadrant of the intersection of the railroad tracks and Old Mount Holly Road. Because the depot will remain within the historic district and be oriented towards the tracks, it will remain a contributing element in the district following the move. The boundaries for the historic depot will likely be the footprint of the building, plus a surrounding buffer of about ten feet. While the effect of the relocation and improvement of Freedom Drive on the relocated depot must be considered, as we currently understand the project, it should not adversely affect the historic depot nor should it trigger compliance with Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act.

That said, it will be important to consider the amount of land that will remain in the depot parcel and access to that parcel. As we discussed, to ensure the preservation of the depot at its new location, it will be crucial that the parcel on which the depot sits (not its footprint and buffer area) has easy access to and from the neighboring streets and adequate parking. A historic building without these elements will not be useable and, without a use, a historic building has little hope of preservation.

I hope that these comments will be of use and provide the necessary information to assure the City that both projects are doable and mutually beneficial. Please contact me, if you need any additional assistance.

TIP & LRTP Amendments and Conformity Determination

ACTION REQUESTED

For project TIP project U-5519, N. Community House Road bridge and extension, the following actions are requested:

- make a conformity determination on the amended TIP and amended 2035 LRTP;
- amend the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan to shift the project from the 2025 horizon year to the 2015 horizon year; and
- amend the TIP to place the project in FY 2013.*

TCC RECOMMENDATION

The TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO take all three actions mentioned above.

BACKGROUND

N. Community House Road is an existing two-lane road classified as a minor thoroughfare. MUMPO's Thoroughfare Plan recommends that existing segments north and south of I-485 be linked with a bridge crossing the freeway; the proposed project that will link the two sections. The bridge is not a funded project in the TIP, but is in the 2035 LRTP's 2025 horizon year. Although the bridge is to be constructed with private funds, the MPO must act because the impact on the interstate triggers a federal action.

*The original NCDOT request was for MUMPO to amend the TIP to fund the project in federal fiscal year (FFY) 2012; however, NCDOT is now requesting that it be funded in FFY 2013. This change is due to a lack of time to authorize the project between the MPO's scheduled action on September 19 and the start of federal fiscal year (FFY) 2013 on October 1. The shift from FFY 2012 to FFY 2013 will not result in a construction delay.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

- A 30-day public comment period ended on September 6; no comments were received.
- A public meeting was held on Wednesday, August 15.
- Notice of the public meeting and comment period was provided by:
 - o advertisements in the Mecklenburg Times and South Charlotte Weekly;
 - o distribution of a media release;
 - o a posting on MUMPO's website; and
 - o an e-mail blast via MUMPO's stakeholders list.




Figure 1 **Project Area**

SUBJECT: Environmental Justice - Public Involvement Plan Amendments

ACTION REQUESTED

The MPO is requested to amend the Public Involvement Plan (PIP) to:

- Address how it will engage low-income and minority communities in the metropolitan planning process; and
- Establish a limited English proficiency (LEP) plan to assist in providing an opportunity for all citizens to participate in the planning process fully – regardless of their proficiency in speaking English.

In addition to the two actions noted above, based upon comments received during the 45-day public comment period, staff recommends that the PIP also be amended to include a statement that MUMPO's outreach efforts when adopting an updated Transportation Improvement Program satisfies the City of Charlotte's requirement of public participation for the Program of Projects (POP) when included in the TIP process.

TCC RECOMMENDATION

The TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO approve the amendments to the Public Involvement Plan.

BACKGROUND

MUMPO's 2008 Certification Review recommended that MUMPO's Public Involvement Plan be updated to improve outreach efforts to the low-income and minority communities. Following that, staff was advised of the need to prepare a Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plan.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

- A 45-day public comment period was held from April 30 through June 13; no comments were received.
- Notice of the comment period was provided by:
 - o advertisements in the Mecklenburg Times, Charlotte Post and Que Pasa;
 - o distribution of a media release:
 - o a posting on MUMPO's website; and
 - o an e-mail blast via MUMPO's stakeholders list.
- Approximately 20 stakeholders were sent hardcopies of the draft documents and requested to provide comments.

TCC RECOMMENDATION

The TCC unanimously recommended that the MPO endorse the draft boundary. The TCC's recommendation included endorsing a slightly expanded Lincoln County boundary. See below for more information.


BACKGROUND

The establishment of a draft planning area boundary is critical to a number of efforts associated with revising the Memorandum of Understanding. One of the most significant is updating the MPO's voting structure, but other issues such as MPO fees and updating the functional classification system are also important.

BOUNDARY STATUS

- Union County: the Board of Commissioners adopted a revised boundary between the MPO and the Rocky River RPO on August 30, 2012.
- Lincoln County:
 - o the Board of Commissioners adopted a MUMPO boundary on August 6, 2012, and the adopted boundary is reflected on the attached map
 - a small portion of the Gastonia urbanized area (UZA) encroaches upon Lincoln County, which means that the Gaston MPO would have to implement the metropolitan planning process in that area; however, Lincoln County has determined that it does not wish to participate in the Gaston MPO
 - o consequently, Lincoln County and the Gaston MPO's TCC have agreed to cede the portion of the Gastonia UZA in Lincoln County to MUMPO, thereby resulting in an expansion of MUMPO's planning area in Lincoln County by approximately 10 square miles
 - MUMPO's TCC endorsed this expansion at its September 13 meeting
- Iredell County: the Board of Commissioners has not taken official action, but has been presented with a scenario on several occasions that uses the S. Yadkin River as the northern boundary, with a slight variation to ensure that the entire I-40 corridor is in the MPO's planning area. The county lines will be used for the eastern and western boundaries.

1. Welcome & Introductions

MPO Chairman Ted Biggers welcomed everyone to the meeting. All present introduced themselves.

2. August Meeting Minutes

Summary:

The subcommittee determined that it would take action at each meeting to approve the previous meeting's minutes.

Motion:

Sarah McAulay made a motion to approve the July 2012 meeting minutes as presented. Mayor Taylor seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the July 2012 minutes were approved unanimously.

3. Project Updates

Presenter:

Robert Cook

Summary:

a. Iredell County & Lincoln County subcommittee membership

Mr. Cook stated that the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners had appointed Carl Robinson to serve on the subcommittee, and that the three Iredell County municipalities had agreed to the appointment of Statesville Mayor Pro Tem Michael Johnson as their joint representative. Chairman Biggers thanked Mr. Robinson and Mr. Johnson for agreeing to serve on the subcommittee.

Joey Raczkowski of Iredell County noted that the Iredell County Board of Commissioners would likely appoint its representative on August 21.

b. MUMPO website

Mr. Cook stated that the MPO website had been updated to include a resource page for the MOU Subcommittee. He also noted that the website's Meetings page had been updated to include the subcommittee's meeting dates. It was further noted that a media advisory had been distributed notifying all local media outlets about the subcommittee and the MOU revision process.

4. Review of Major Topics

Summary:

Mr. Cook reviewed an updated list of major topics potentially crucial to the MOU revision process. He stated that the list included five additional items from when it was first distributed prior to the July meeting: three of the five were identified by subcommittee members during the July meeting and two were identified by local staff. Mr. Cook went on to state that the subcommittee had requested that a schedule be prepared, but that doing so was difficult without the topics being prioritized. The subcommittee agreed that prioritizing the issues would be useful and directed staff to undertake such an effort.

Motion:

Dumont Clarke made a motion to direct staff to prioritize the major topics, and then prepare a draft schedule based upon the prioritization process outcome to be presented to the subcommittee at the September meeting. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

5. MPO Bylaws

Summary:

Mr. Cook recommended that staff be permitted to work on a parallel effort to update the MPO's bylaws because the MOU and the bylaws are closely related. He specifically mentioned the bylaws could potentially deal with such topics as adding a Consent Agenda feature to the MPO meeting agendas, as well as TIP and CTP amendment processes.

Subcommittee members then discussed a variety of issues:

- There was general agreement that a "Consent" feature should be included in MPO meeting agendas.
- Concern was expressed with adopting bylaws before new members are incorporated into the MPO.
 - Staff committed to exploring the procedural issues of what jurisdictions will cast votes to adopt the revised MOU and revised bylaws.
- A one year term for the chairman and vice-chairman is too short; possibly consider lengthening terms to two years.
- MPO delegates should be required to serve on the MPO for two years before being eligible for chairman or vice-chairman.
- The meeting schedule should be improved-six meetings a year is insufficient; more meetings and subcommittee meetings could allow for more involvement with other transportation-related issues.
 - o Concerns were expressed with adding meetings; special meetings are always an option.

Motion:

No formal motion was made, but there was consensus among the subcommittee members that a parallel effort to revise the bylaws was appropriate.

6. TIP Amendments

Summary:

Mr. Cook stated that recent changes in Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) policies has resulted in the MPO taking action to amend the TIP at almost every meeting, and in many cases for very minor changes. He presented TIP amendment and modification guidelines recently adopted by the NC Board of Transportation, stating they could be used as model for the MPO. Preliminary draft changes were reviewed. It was noted that procedures resulting from MPO action would not be added to the MOU in full since MOUs are designed to focus on broader matters.

Motion:

Mayor Taylor made a motion directing staff to prepare guidelines for TIP amendments based upon those adopted by the NC Board of Transportation. Ms. McAulay seconded the motion. Upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

7. Other Issues

Summary:

- The subcommittee requested a list of current and incoming members.
- A question was asked about the final boundary. Staff stated that it was still under consideration, but that meetings were being held with local officials that should result in a draft boundary being presented at the September MPO meeting.
- A question was asked about the population figures and their relationship to voting privileges. Staff replied that efforts on that topic were underway.
