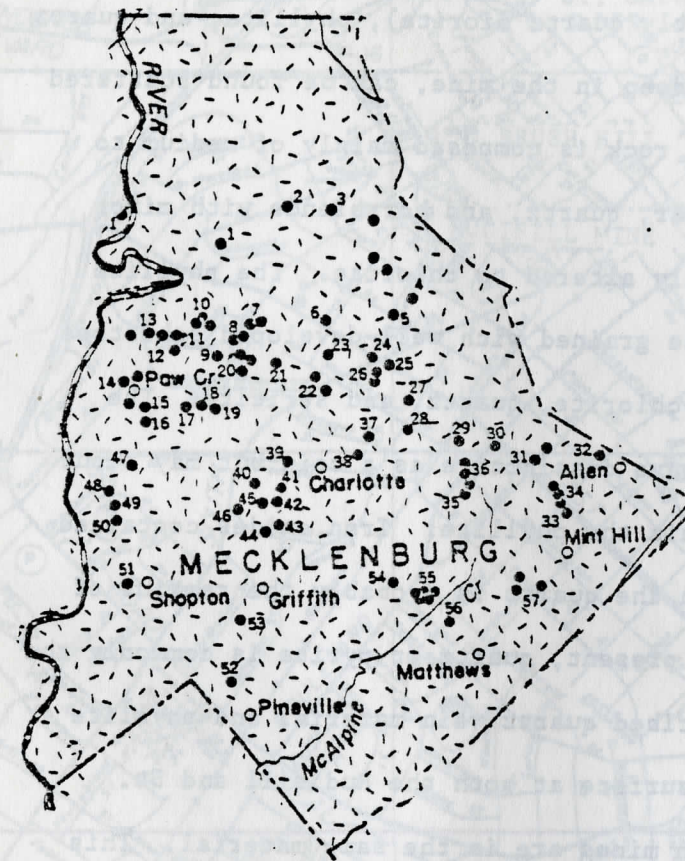


Figure 3. Geologic Map of Mecklenburg County, North Carolina
