




Blue Line Extension: Northeast Corridor

Project Overview

- 9.3 miles, 11 stations
- 4 park and ride facilities
- Approximately 3,100 parking spaces
- Accommodates 3-car trains
- o 25,000+ daily riders
- Improvements to Highway 29 north of Old Concord Road
- Connects UNC Charlotte campuses
- Initial peak period service 7.5 minute frequency
- Connecting bus services
- Revenue service in 2017












Retaining Walls

State Funding Agreement Signed	March 2012
FTA Approval to Enter Final Design	May 2012
Federal Funding Agreement Signed	October 2012
Advanced Utility Relocation Begins	June 2013
Right-of-Way Acquisitions Complete	January 2014
Start Major Civil Construction	January 2014
Begin Testing and Integration	December 2016
Initiate Revenue Service	March 2017



- Real Estate acquisition underway
 - 322 parcels
 - 20 business relocations
- o BLE Transit Station Area Plans
 - Council approved in May
- \circ Demolition
 - 9 structures, currently underway
- Advanced Utility Contracts
