University City Area Plan


On Tuesday, December 9, 2014, the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning Department and CATS hosted a community meeting where residents had the opportunity to learn about what's included in the draft University City Area Plan. The meeting focused on policy recommendations for land use, community design, transportation, and open space within University City as future development occurs. This plan will influence future development decisions and guide infrastructure improvements

The draft document will be posted to the University City Area Plan project website prior to January 1, 2015. Planning staff will accept comments

from the community regarding draft recommendations throughout the review and adoption process that will begin in January 2015. Opportunities for public comment will be available during a regularly scheduled Planning Committee meeting and during a City Council meeting (exact dates are to be determined). Affected property owners will receive a notification by mail and information will also be available on the project website.

Blue Line Extension: Northeast Corridor

Building the foundations of Charlotte's future

Fall has brought a wave of retaining wall construction throughout the corridor. The walls being built along North Tryon Street will hold back the soil that will be under the new roadway, with bike lanes and sidewalks, creating space in the median for the Blue Line Extension (BLE) tracks. Construction crews are building retaining walls along the railroad corridor to widen the area, next to the railroad tracks, where the light rail will be built.

A number of the light rail bridges along the alignment require a different type of retaining wall called a mechanically stabilized earth or MSE wall. The MSE walls are structures that are connected at the beginning and end of the bridges, at the intersections where the light rail will cross over.

Crews are constructing MSE walls and driving piles for the support structures of the light rail bridges that will pass over the I-85 Connector and University City Boulevard intersections. These bridges will allow vehicular traffic to flow normally without a grade crossing.

Retaining walls are not the only thing going up along the alignment. Stations are already beginning to take shape. One of the 11 stations along the BLE, the Old Concord Station, already has a solid foundation constructed. Old Concord Station will have a surface lot with approximately 330 vehicle spaces, bicycle spaces, and a bus bay for hassle-free connections. Closer to Uptown, crews have begun the foundation of the Parkwood station. This station will be a walk-up station at the corner of Parkwood and Brevard. Continue on next page...

Building the foundations of Charlotte's future

The BLE alignment is becoming more visible, significantly changing the appearance of the corridor. Crews have made significant progress on the northern end of the alignment along North Tryon Street and around the UNC Charlotte Station area. Work will soon become apparent on the bridges across the I-85 Connector and University City Boulevard intersections. Early in 2015, crews will begin removing sidewalks, and curbs, and altering driveways to prepare for matching the grade of the new roadway in multiple areas along North Tryon Street. When the BLE is complete, North Tryon Street from Old Concord

Road to the UNC Charlotte Station area will be better equipped to handle different types of traffic. Pedestrians will have sidewalks on both sides of the street. Bicyclists will have designated bike lanes on the roadway. Transit riders will be able to get from UNC Charlotte to Uptown in 22 minutes, making safe and easy bus connections at various light rail stations along the way.

As construction continues to improve transit in the Queen City, expect to see roadway work and adjustments to the traffic pattern, especially on North Tryon Street. Stay alert and follow directions from construction flaggers. Please stay out of work sites and be mindful when you are around construction areas. Let's keep working together, building our city's future and continuing to keep everyone safe.

WINTER SAFETY AROUND CONSTRUCTION ZONES



- Slow down when driving in winter weather and increase your stopping distance
- Clean windows and mirrors
- **BE CAREFUL** of ice on driveways and roadways in freezing temperatures. You can encounter ice when you least expect it, especially in the mornings and evenings as temperatures drop
- STAY ALERT for signage and follow directions from construction flaggers
- Please stay out of work sites and be mindful when you are around construction areas
- Know your route plan ahead and avoid potential congestion due to road and lane closures
- WATCH OUT for and read message boards on roadways for important information or detour directions

Construction began in November on the J.W. Clay Boulevard and University City Boulevard parking garages.

"These parking decks will be easily accessed from both I-85 and I-485 and provide convenient access to the LYNX Blue Line Extension," said Project Manager, Kathleen Santimaw.

The J.W. Clay Boulevard parking garage will have five levels with 800 spaces for cars and 14 covered bicycle spaces. Construction will also include two bus bays along the private street adjacent to the parking garage, and a pedestrian bridge on the third level connecting the parking garage to the north end of the station platform.

The University City Boulevard parking garage will have six levels and approximately 1,500 spaces for cars and 24 covered bicycle spaces. Construction will include three bus bays along a private driveway and a pedestrian bridge on the fourth level to the University City Boulevard Station platform.

These parking decks are two of the largest park and ride facilities along the LYNX Blue Line Extension. They will be managed by the City's Engineering & Property Management Department, Special Projects Division. ONGOING LONG TERM CLOSURES

E 8th Street is closed between College Street and Brevard Street for approximately 6 months.

Access to all businesses and parking lots will be maintained.



East 16th Street between Parkwood and North Tryon is closed until February 2015.

Westbound detour via Parkwood Avenue, North Caldwell Street, 12th Street, North College Street and North Tryon Street. Eastbound detour is North Tryon Street, 11th Street, North Caldwell Street, and Parkwood Avenue.

NO pedestrian or vehicular traffic will be able to cross the railroad tracks or travel into this work zone.



BE ALERT

There are ongoing intermittent lane closures along North Tryon due to ongoing construction activities, particularly in the median.




ONGOING LONG TERM CLOSURES

E 36th Street will remain closed at the Norfolk Southern railroad crossing just north of North Davidson Street for approximately 2 years.

Detour via North Davidson Street, Jordan Place, Matheson Avenue and North Tryon Street.


NO pedestrian or vehicular traffic will be able to cross the railroad tracks or travel into this work zone.



Eastway Drive is closed at the railroad bridge until late Spring 2015.

Detour via North Tryon Street and Sugar Creek Road.

NO pedestrian or vehicular traffic will be able to cross the bridge.




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Increasing Visibility and Adapting to Market Demands
